Emergency Situations at School

Information for Families

What are the types of actions a school might take in the event of an emergency?

LOCKDOWN:

Ordered when there is a threat on campus. Students should go to the nearest room. Teachers will lock doors and close blinds.

SHELTER IN PLACE:

Ordered when there is an issue off campus or a non-threat on campus. Teachers will lock doors but business will continue on as usual in the classrooms.

EVACUATION:

Ordered when there is a fire, gas leak, etc. After the fire alarm sounds, students will exit the building.

EARTHQUAKE/TORNADO:

Ordered when there is an earthquake or a tornado approaching. Students should get under desk/table and away from anything that could fall over.

HOLD:

Ordered when there is a situation on campus that requires privacy, such as a student situation or a teacher down. Students stay in classroom but continue business as usual.

- Some situations may require a combination of actions above.
- School and district staff train yearly on emergency protocols and situation management.
- Students take part in various drills throughout each school year.

What emergencies might impact a school? And which actions are taken?

Police activity in the area, bomb threat, severe weather, disorderly conduct, etc.: In these instances, the response is usually to shelter in place

Intruder, gunfire, explosions, etc.: Result in a lockdown.

Fire, gas or chemical leak, etc.: Students will first **shelter in place** until it is confirmed that there is a fire, leak, etc. This is to prevent an intruder from luring people into the halls by pulling the fire alarm. A fire, leak, etc. could lead to an **evacuation.**

Teacher down, medical emergency, private situation: Events like these that require privacy will lead to a **hold.**

Earthquake or tornado: if students are indoors they should duck under a desk/table and stay away from anything that could fall over. If they are outside, drop to the ground and away from buildings in the event of an **earthquake**. For a **tornado**, students should move indoors if possible or lay in a ditch/low area if outside.

What do I need to know, do, and not do as the parent?

- Before an emergency: Make sure your emergency contact numbers are updated and on file in the school office.
- **During an emergency:** Do your best to remain calm. Your example will cue others to respond similarly.
- Communication: Your best source for updated information is official
 DJUSD communication. Parents will be notified by our School Messenger
 system. Additional info may be available on our website and Facebook
 page.
- Releasing students: Until you receive the message that your student will be released, please do not come to campus. This is for your and your student's safety.

Role of a student in a crisis

- Students are instructed in and practice how to respond in a crisis situation at school.
- Students should stay calm and listen to instruction from teachers, administrators, or crisis responders.
- In the absence of adult direction, decide where it is safest to be and remain there.
- Do not perpetuate rumors. This includes calls, texts, email, and/or social media.
