

Arbor Heights PTSA Executive Officer Positions

President

Presides at all meetings and plans the meeting agenda ahead of time with the PTSA secretary, utilizing input from others. The president must maintain impartiality when serving as the presiding officer at meetings and be knowledgeable of basic parliamentary procedure.

It is important that the president delegate responsibility; empower others and appreciate their efforts. She/he should attend leadership training and education, and encourage other officers, chairs and members to attend. She/he should communicate regularly with officers and chairs and maintain visibility to the membership. The president should have a positive relationship with the principal and staff and encourage PTSA members to do the same. She/he should promote a positive image of PTSA within the community. Good communication skills are vital.

The president should become familiar with the objectives of PTA, the Washington State PTA Uniform Bylaws, and the unit or council standing rules and be aware of and utilize PTSA resources from the council, State PTSA, and National PTSA. It is important that the president is aware of required deadlines for: the payment of membership service fees, registration for workshops and conferences, application for awards, and submittals for recommendations—as well as annual corporation report, charitable solicitations registration, insurance renewal, and tax filings. The president reviews the PTA bank statements.

State PTA Bylaw tasks

“The president shall”:

- (1) Preside at all meetings;
- (2) Serve as spokesperson for the local unit;
- (3) Make appointments to positions and committees as designated in the standing rules, with approval of the executive committee, for a term of one (1) year;
- (4) Be an ex-officio member of all committees except the nominating committee;
- (5) Disseminate and communicate all information received pertinent to PTSA/PTSA programs;
- (6) Perform all duties pertaining to the office such as specified in these WSPTA Uniform Bylaws and the standing rules;
- (7) Send to the WSPTA Office the names and addresses of the newly elected officers for the upcoming year immediately upon election but no later than May 1;
- (8) Participate in the election of the region director; and
- (9) Assure local unit representation at council meetings if the local unit is a member of a council.

Vice President

Performs the duties of president in the absence or inability of that officer to serve, and shall assist the president when called upon. In case of a vacancy in the office of president, the first vice president or the vice presidents in their order, shall temporarily assume the duties until the vacancy is filled.

(State PTA Bylaws)

The position of vice president is one that can be adapted to the needs of each individual PTA. Look at the job description of the president and determine which tasks or duties can be delegated or shared by the vice president.

Treasurer

The treasurer shall serve as an active participant on the board of directors and executive committee and attend all the meetings of each. The treasurer should serve as chair of the budget committee and present the budget to the membership. The treasurer should keep an accurate and detailed account, in the books and records of the PTSA, of all funds received and all funds disbursed. The treasurer should submit a written monthly financial report at each meeting of the PTA (both general membership and board of directors). The treasurer must provide all financial records if requested by the president or members of the board. It is important that the treasurer (or designated person) receives all funds for the PTA and promptly deposits all funds only into the PTSA's bank account; handles only PTSA funds; and, does not deposit funds of other organizations or ASB funds into the PTSA account. Bills should be paid BY CHECK ONLY signed by two authorized executive committee members. All financial obligations of the PTSA must be authorized by the board of directors or the membership. It is important for the treasurer to attend the State PTSA "PTA and the Law" workshop and a State PTA "Money Matters" class. The treasurer should read and understand all references to membership service fees and finances that can be found in the Uniform Bylaws, the PTSA's standing rules, and State PTA materials. The treasurer should forward, to the Washington State PTA, through the appropriate channels, the State PTA portion of the membership service fees accompanied by the properly completed forms. The treasurer must preserve all vouchers, receipts, bank statements, cancelled checks, and other records, and submit these to the Financial Review committee when requested, or to the board of directors or membership when requested and maintain complete financial records as specified in the records retention timetable. The books must be closed as of June 30 and the books and records submitted for financial review to the financial review committee appointed by the president. The financial review committee shall not include any person who was authorized to sign on the bank account for the period under review. The treasurer delivers to his successor, all books and records, including historical records, promptly at the conclusion of his/her term of office.

State PTA Bylaw tasks "The treasurer shall":

- (1) Serve as chair of the budget committee; present the budget to the membership; keep accurate records at all times; receive, issue receipts, and deposit promptly in an authorized account all monies and disburse same according to the approved yearly budget;
- (2) Present a written financial report every month and at such other times as required by the president; provide all financial records if requested by the president or board of directors members; and close the books on June 30 and submit the books and records for financial review;
- (3) Perform such other duties as may be provided for in the standing rules; and
- (4) Keep a record of membership service fees, transmitting same accompanied by membership lists bearing the names and addresses of members to the council treasurer. Local units not affiliated with a council shall transmit same to the WSPTA Office. A duplicate membership list shall be provided to the local unit secretary.

Co-Treasurer Duties:

This document lists detail tasks (as opposed to the more general responsibilities defined by the State PTA) of the role of Treasurer.

Treasurer Role #1 –

Good for someone who is at the school often.

Duties include: Make all deposits from fundraising and events. This requires recounting fundraiser money, cash boxes, etc. and assuring there is sufficient back up) Write all checks (assuring items are within budget and approved prior to releasing funds) and obtain a second signature (we can add Presidents as signers as well to broaden the signature availability). Track all inflow and out flow of funds in the check register. Forward well documented deposit receipts and paid check request/invoices, as well as copies of the check register to the

co-treasurer. Make cash boxes available for fundraisers and events. Communicate with teachers and staff regarding spending allowances and balances.

Treasurer Role #2

Good for someone who has some accounting/bookkeeping background. Familiarity with Excel and QuickBooks is helpful. Enter all checks and deposits into QuickBooks to the proper accounts. Reconcile bank statements (as well as review online bank account regularly). Track teacher/staff stipends. Assure items are within budget and income is sufficient to pay budgeted expenses and projects. Run monthly financial reports and populate budget format for meetings. Financials are cash basis only so it is pretty simple accounting. Go over financials and budget at each Board and General meeting. Process all credit cards for fundraisers, including Auction (also reconciled auction sales but not necessary part of treasurer's responsibilities). Process 990EZ form (federal tax reporting form for non-profits) prior to November. Process 1099's (if any) for end of calendar year by January 31st. Process other state non-profit and PTA forms. Develop budget for following year.

Secretary

The Secretary shall take minutes and record all business transacted at each meeting (board and general meetings) of the unit/council, and of the executive committee, making sure all minutes are complete. The secretary must prepare the minutes for approval at the next meeting. Together with the president, the secretary should plan the meeting agenda and inform the president of any unfinished business at the meetings. The secretary also issues all "calls" or notices of meetings and conducts such correspondence as the board of directors or executive committee may designate. At meetings the secretary also determines if a quorum is present, handles attendance, and in the event both the president and the vice president are absent, calls the meeting to order and asks for nominations for a chair pro-tem.

The secretary should work with the treasurer and the membership chair to keep an up-to-date roster of members and keep an up-to-date record of all committees, making sure the names, addresses, email addresses and phone numbers of new officers and any changes in this data are entered via WSPTA's online membership enrollment program, and serve in other ways as directed by the standing rules or by the president. It is important that the secretary also attend a State PTA "secretary's" workshop to learn in greater detail how to better perform this job. At the end of the year (June 30) the secretary should be sure all copies of the legal documents notebooks

State PTA Bylaw tasks "The secretary shall":

- (1) Keep accurate records of all meetings;
- (2) Notify the president of any unfinished business;
- (3) Be responsible for correspondence as designated by the president;
- (4) Keep a complete roster of the membership of all standing and special committees;
- (5) Perform such other duties as provided for in the WSPTA Uniform Bylaws or standing rules; and
- (6) Maintain a complete roster of all members.

Secretary Duties:

Board Meetings

Launch a dialog to the AHPTA Google group, seeking agenda items. This task may alternatively be done by the President at their discretion. Create the final agenda and send it to the AHPTSA Google group.

Print copies of the final agenda and pass them out before the meeting. Print copies of the previous meeting notes and pass them out before the meeting. Ask for approval of the previous meeting notes at the start of the meeting. Take notes at the meeting. Publish the notes to the AHPTSA Google group. Send a note to AHPTSA Google group asking for review of the notes. File all meeting artifacts in the Secretary's binder with a tab indicating the month and year, including the meeting agenda, notes, financial report and anything else handed out at the meeting.

General Meetings (following the same pattern as above)

Launch a dialog to the AHPTSA Google group, seeking agenda items. This task may alternatively be done by the President at their discretion. Create the final agenda and send it to the AHPTSA Google group.

Print copies of the final agenda and pass them out before the meeting. Print copies of the previous meeting notes and pass them out before the meeting. Ask for approval of the previous meeting notes at the start of the meeting. Take notes at the meeting. Publish the notes to the AHPTSA Google group. Send a note to AHPTSA Google group asking for review of the notes. File all meeting artifacts in the Secretary's binder with a tab indicating the month and year, including the meeting agenda, notes, financial report and anything else handed out at the meeting.

Other Tasks

Record members in the State PTA website.

File other documents as requested for chapter reference in the Secretary's binder in a readily accessible section, such as proof of insurance.

Arbor Heights PTA Chair Positions

Legislative Chair

You can be an effective chair with as little as two hours per month—one hour attending your monthly board meeting and one hour staying informed, writing letters and making calls. Stay updated on issues that affect schools, families and children. Report on those issues at the general meetings, in the weekly bulletin and through the PTSA email list when appropriate.

For a successful advocacy year:

1. Make sure your membership chair has reported your name to the state PTA office as legislative chair.
2. Sign up with the State PTA office for the Legislative Talk and Action Alert List serves. You can do this on the State PTA Web page at www.wastatepta.org or email support@wastatepta.org.
3. Access the State PTA website at www.wastatepta.org for the Grassroots Advocate sheet to pass around at each meeting to recruit other child advocates.
4. Make sure that your local PTA has legislation on each board and general meeting agenda. Prepare for the meeting by checking the State PTA's website, copying articles of interest from the newspaper, announcing upcoming town hall meetings, etc.
5. Ask for space in your PTSA newsletter for a legislative column. If you are not a writer, look on the State PTA website for ideas or contact your Council or Region Legislation Chair.
6. Make sure your local PTA has a budget for legislation. It should include funds for copying, postage, legislative Assembly, and other expenses.
7. Plan on attending the annual Legislative Assembly in October. This is a two-day gathering to share, debate, discuss and decide the legislative priorities of the Washington State PTA for the year. It also includes informative workshop.

Fundraising Chair

Fundraising is one way the PTSA can pay for its programs, projects and activities. The fundraising chair works with the PTSA Board & membership to determine fundraising activities for the year. Works with office staff to coordinate with the school calendar. The fundraising chair recruits volunteers to chair individual fundraising activities and provide assistance when needed.

As with any activity where funds are involved, the treasurer and the fundraising chair must work together to see that the funds are promptly deposited into the PTA's account and properly recorded in the PTA's books. The fundraising chair should deliver the funds to the treasurer frequently. Do not wait until the fundraising activity is completed before giving the money to the treasurer for deposit. When a fundraising chair gives funds to the treasurer, they both should count the money and verify the amount. The treasurer should issue a receipt to the fundraising chair.

Community Events and Volunteer Co-chairs

Recruits volunteers for all non-fundraising school activities and provides support as needed.

Membership Chair

The membership chair leads membership recruitment/renewal efforts. The membership chair recruits a committee, plans a membership campaign and prepares campaign materials.

The membership chair collects and processes fees appropriately. He/she enrolls members in the WSPTA web-based system and sends fees and remittance forms to council/State PTA on a regular basis. The membership chair maintains accurate membership records for your local unit. At the end of the school year, the membership chair passes all pertinent materials on to their successor.

Communications Chair

The Communications Chair shall be responsible for communicating all PTA events to the Arbor Heights Office for publishing of events in school newsletter. He/She shall oversee communication on PTA website and help all chairs distribute information/flyers newsletters, etc. to the Arbor Heights community and staff.

Auction Co- chairs

Leads the Auction Committee in planning our annual adults-only, off-campus spring fundraiser consisting of dinner and a live/silent auction.

Gardening Chair

Leads the Gardening committee, with volunteers/student helpers, to beautify the garden and coordinates a summer watering schedule.
