

In July 2021, YouGov conducted polls on the popularity of adding oral health coverage to Medicare.



A national poll was conducted from July 6th through July 13th among a sample of 1,000 likely 2022 midterm voters of varying ideologies.


The poll further analyzed the preferences of likely midterm voters in 2022 senate battleground states: AZ, FL, GA, NV, NH, NC, PA, WI







The results indicate broad national support for adding an oral health benefit to Medicare.



More than three-quarters of likely voters support adding oral health coverage to Medicare.















Support for adding an oral health benefit to Medicare is even higher in 2022 battleground states.



More than eight in 10 battleground voters support adding oral health coverage to Medicare.



Majority support for adding the benefit was found across key population segments.







Race & ethnicity


Believe any Medicare savings should be used to introduce oral health benefits
