MEDICARE FACTS



Medicare does NOT currently cover:

- Preventive and routine care, such as check-ups, cleanings, x-rays, fillings
- Major care, such as crowns, bridges, root canals, dentures, oral surgery



29 million people in Medicare had no dental visit in past year (pre-COVID)¹

 Rates of having no dental visits are higher among people who are Black, Hispanic, and/or low-income¹



Risks associated with untreated oral health problems:

- Exacerbation of chronic disease, such as heart disease and diabetes²
- Costly Emergency Department visits
- Chronic oral pain and malnourishment
- Tooth loss 15% of people in Medicare have lost all their teeth¹
