AmeriCorps VISTA Program

Volunteers in Service to America (VISTA) was established in 1965 as a national service program designed specifically to fight poverty in America. In 1993, VISTA was incorporated into the AmeriCorps network of programs under the Corporation for National and Community Service (CNCS). AmeriCorps VISTA Members make a year-long, full-time commitment to serve on a specific project at a nonprofit organization or public agency. They focus their efforts to build the organizational, administrative, and financial capacity of organizations that fight illiteracy, improve health services, foster economic development, and otherwise assist low-income communities.

Virginia Housing Alliance's VISTA Project

The Virginia Housing Alliance (VHA), state and national partners, and our service provider partners across Virginia are working to reduce homelessness and expand affordable housing opportunities through education, advocacy, training, and capacity building. The VHA VISTA project provides the human capital necessary to deliver on the ground technical support to agencies developing, providing, or otherwise supporting homeless response systems and expanding affordable housing. VISTA Members will be placed in 18 Host Sites across the state, providing key leadership, guidance, and direction to help VHA's local partners achieve greater impact for their clients.

VHA VISTA Host Site Eligibility

An agency is eligible if it is the lead entity representing a Continuum of Care (CoC) in the Commonwealth of Virginia, local planning group (LPG) that participates in the Balance of State (BOS) Continuum of Care, or a homeless services agency with a history of collaboration with its CoC/LPG. Other eligible agencies include community action agencies, nonprofit housing developers, Faith based or nonprofit organizations with a 501(c) designation, community development financial institutions, planning district commissions, affordable housing providers, other regional service providers, or a government agency: city, county, regional, state, tribal or federal.

Since 2014, the VHA has worked with over 30 agencies across Virginia to become VHA VISTA Host Sites. A few of the agencies that have been VISTA Host Sites include:

- **Piedmont Housing Alliance**, Charlottesville, VA: PHA is dedicated to improving financial outcomes for individuals and families by offering innovative affordable housing solutions.
- Maggie Walker Land Trust, Richmond, VA: MWCLT seeks to develop and steward permanently affordable housing opportunities to foster racially equitable communities.
- **Miriam's House**, Lynchburg, VA: Miriam's House works to end homelessness by connecting families with stable, affordable housing and providing the skills and supports that lead to self-sufficiency.



As a VHA VISTA Host Site, organizations are expected to delegate a main Site Supervisor who will work with the VISTA member and the VHA VISTA Program Manager throughout the service year. Host Sites also provide the following:

Project Planning

Host Sites will work with VHA to develop a VISTA Assignment Description (VAD) or work plan with measurable results. These documents are approved by CNCS.

Daily Supervision

VISTA Host Sites oversee the day-to-day management of the project and the VISTA member, including providing support, feedback, guidance, training, and mentoring. Site Supervisors spend an average of 15 hours per month supervising a VISTA (*expect more during the first few weeks*).

Sustainability

Host Sites develop a VISTA project with a goal to phase out the VISTA after 3 years but continue the legacy of the project.

VISTA Member Work Space

Host Sites provide a comfortable and welcoming work environment, including office spaces, computer, phone, and email access.

On Site Orientation Training

Host Sites must provide an on-site training that helps the VISTA member understand their project, meet the organization's employees, and learn the ins and outs of the organization.

Host Site Fees

The VHA VISTA project is a cost-share partnership, in which all parties contribute to the success and outcomes of the VISTA program at their Host Site. Investment by the Host Site and the community is fundamental, as the VISTA resources are intended to be short-term and for a max 3 year cycle.

What a Host Site contributes....

What the VISTA member receives....

- Living Allowance Members receive a living allowance ranging from \$17,000 to \$21,000.
 - Healthcare and Childcare Benefits

A \$6,435 education award or an \$1,800 service stipend for each VISTA member

Relocation allowances (if eligible)

What the Host Site receives....

- One full time VISTA to serve 35-40 hours/week for 12 months
- Capacity building services identified as most critical to the organization
- Additional volunteers, grant revenue, and/or in-kind donations that the VISTA member generates for your organization*
- 3 year VISTA cycle with VHA do not need to re-submit full application each year

*On average, a single VISTA member leverages \$125,000 for their Host Site organization through donations, grants, and partnerships. In 2020, all 14 Host Sites recorded that their organization was made more efficient and effective by their VISTA.

"To date, Bay Aging has expanded their role in homeless services by assuming the formal role of the NNMPHC Lead Agency as recognized by the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development, conducting coordinated entry diversion and referral assistance for all individuals in the region experiencing a housing crisis, adopting a Department of Housing and Urban Development-approved homeless preference for Bay Aging's 317 age and income-restricted apartments, and providing COVID-19 related emergency housing assistance. This expansion is attributed to VHA's AmeriCorps VISTA capacity building and technical assistance, which acted as a spark to ignite the potential to increase these services in the area."

VHA VISTA Program Priorities

The VHA VISTA program has two program priority areas:

- Economic Opportunity: Virginia Housing Alliance will support capacity building projects that leverage an AmeriCorps member to develop viable communities by promoting integrated approaches that provide decent housing, a suitable living environment, and expand economic opportunities for low and moderate-income persons.
 Host Site's projects should either work to expand affordable housing, end homelessness, or prevent evictions.
- 2. Priority Populations: Rural Communities, Indian Country (term used by CNCS), and areas of deep poverty.

Some examples of capacity building work within these two areas are the following:

Community Engagement

VHA VISTAs engage residents of low-income communities in the planning, development, and implementation of their projects while at their Host Site. They utilize community assessments and surveys to identify areas of need, lifting the voices of those that they are serving.

Sustainability

VHA VISTAs develop systems, relationships, and knowledge which they transfer to their Host Site. and their community. VISTAs create a sustainability binder, detailing their work, partnerships, community contacts, and a plan on how to successfully continue their projects long-term.

Racial Equity

VHA VISTA members work to update and ensure their organization's procedures, programs, and planning is both equitable and accessible to all communities and demographics.

Technical Assistance

VHA VISTA members approach to training and technical assistance is to connect community members, partners, and other organizations to share best practices on homelessness and/or affordable housing.

Capacity Building

VHA VISTA members work behind the scenes on data analysis and implementing systems in order to make their organization more efficient and effective. This data is vital in applying for funding, evaluating programs, and ensuring equitability.

Researching Funding Opportunities

VHA VISTA members help to identify new avenues of funding for their organizations, submit grants, and aggregate data to showcase an organization's effectiveness and impact within a community.

Examples of 2020/21 VISTA Projects:

- The St. Joseph's Villa VISTA member redesigned the Crater Area Coalition for the Homeless's (CACH) website in order to
 increase visibility, search-ability, and traffic for service providers within the region. Alongside the website overhaul, the VISTA
 restructured the communications strategy by researching and implementing best programs and practices that led to a 20%
 increase in email open rates amongst members, clients, and providers.
- The Bay Aging VISTA Member completed a Racial Disparities Analysis which looked into racial biases in Bay Aging programs as well as the programs of two other area organizations that serve people facing a housing crisis. The Racial Disparities Analysis findings were presented in a full membership meeting of the Northern Neck Middle Peninsula Housing Coalition and the data from the report has been used in two different grant applications, one of which has been awarded to Bay Aging.
- The Maggie Walker Community Land Trust VISTA member designed and implemented a Buyer Prioritization Policy resulting from a year-long research and data collection study to help prioritize the most marginalized households for housing. This policy helped Maggie Walker Community Land Trust and their board move away from a first-come, first-serve waitlist to a more equitable and just system, helping to serve the most vulnerable populations.



VISTA Work Plan (VAD)

The VHA VISTA project utilizes a work plan, also known as the VISTA Assignment Description (VAD), for the year to help Host Sites layout their project into attainable goals for their VISTA member. The VAD serves as an outline for the VISTA's main project, with activities and goals listed under the 4 main objectives that are consistent throughout all VHA VISTA Host Site projects:

Objective 1: Develop or identify resources that increase capacity and enhance organizational sustainability, efficiency, and effectiveness.

VISTA ACTIVITY EXAMPLES:

Establish a fundraising database to develop, track, and strengthen relationships with supporters.

Provide case examples of program models that have been proven successful in other communities in Virginia and across the nation.

Objective 2: Enhance community and partner engagement to expand affordable

engagement to expand affordable housing and/or homelessness services efforts.

VISTA ACTIVITY EXAMPLES:

Convene stakeholders to advance local affordable housing policy conversations.

Expand participation in CoC/LPG efforts and engage in committees and working groups at the systems level.

Objective 3: Improve the quality of data collection and use in decision-making.

VISTA ACTIVITY EXAMPLES :

Complete affordable housing needs assessments, market studies, etc.

Benchmark provider's project outcomes against community-wide System Performance Measures.


Objective 4: Promote best practices in affordable housing development and/or homelessness services

VISTA ACTIVITY EXAMPLES :

Identify racially equitable procedures and policies to reduce discrimination in housing.

Research best practices to make equity driven changes to Coordinated Entry Prioritization.

On average, a single VHA VISTA member...



- Creates, updates, or enhances 15 systems, procedures, and/or protocols.
- Trains 136 staff and/or community volunteers.
- Writes and submits 4 funding proposals for their host site.
- Recruits 35 new community volunteers.
- Performs 10 community assessments to identify service gaps, resource allocation, and equity throughout programming.

Since 2014, VHA VISTA members have supported homeless services and expanded affordable housing through..

- 1,285 community volunteers recruited.
- 8.8 million cash resources leveraged.
- \$528,624 in-kind resources leveraged.
- 833 organizations received capacity building services.
- 28 VHA VISTAs hired by their host site organizations.

Who are the VISTAs?

VISTA members pursue their assignments for a variety of reasons, ranging from wanting to make a difference in their community to advancing their career through invaluable professional development. More often than not, the VHA VISTAs have been recent graduates or folks looking for a career change.

Basic Requirements

- Be at least 18 years old; no upper age limit
- Be a U.S. citizen or legal permanent resident
- Pass a criminal history review
- Meet knowledge, skill, and ability requirements set by the VHA

Terms of Service

- One year (365 days), full-time assignment
- May re-enroll for a second or third year (up to five terms)
- Work a standard, 40-hour week

Benefits

- While serving, VISTAs receive a modest living allowance that places them at the economic level of the low-income residents of the community where they serve
- VISTAs get an end-of-service education or cash benefit after completing their term
- VISTAs receive health coverage and may be eligible for child care and relocation assistance

Ongoing Professional Development Training

- VISTAs attend a two-day in-person and on-line Virtual Member Orientation focused on poverty issues and run by the Corporation For National and Community Service
- Quarterly in-person trainings focused on homeless services and affordable housing topics
- On-Site Orientation Training provided by the host site to orient the VISTA to their new community and organization
- Attending VHA Conferences and forums
- Free VISTA professional development webinars throughout the year

AmeriCorp

How does the program work during the COVID-19 pandemic?

At this time of the COVID-19 pandemic, CNCS has determined that providing VISTA members the option to teleserve, up to and including full time, as needed, is necessary and appropriate support. Thus, until further notice from CNCS, AmeriCorps VISTA members may teleserve, up to and including full time, as needed and until it is appropriate to return to site full time. The VISTA member and the host site can create a teleservice plan that reflects the Host Site's COVID-19 protocol with the understanding that the VISTA is permitted to telework.

Who will employ the VISTA?

The VISTA Member is a volunteer receiving a living stipend through a federal agency, the Corporation for National and Community Service (CNCS). The VISTA is regarded as a federal employee for limited purposes. The VISTA is affiliated with Virginia Housing Alliance, the Host Site, and the AmeriCorps VISTA Program. This VISTA will carry the title of VHA AmeriCorps VISTA Member and indicate that s/he is serving with your agency.

What a VISTA Member NOT participate in?

In compliance with the Corporation for National and Community Service (CNCS), VISTA Members and their projects cannot:

- Displace a current employee or serve in a regular staff position. VISTA Members cannot fill staff positions.
- Focus on direct-service activities.
- Be involved with political advocacy, religious instruction, voter registration, fundraising for host site match or operating expenses, union organizing, or clerical activities as part of their duties.
- Have full-time employment outside of VISTA responsibilities or be a full-time student

How can host sites be ensured that the VISTA is qualified to assist the community/agency?

The VISTA applicants are screened and interviewed by both the Host Site and VHA. VISTA Members need to be approved by the host site, VHA, and CNCS. CNCS will provide an initial orientation focused on poverty and capacity building. VHA staff will provide a training focused on affordable housing at the federal and state level and the VISTA work plans. The Host Site will orient the VISTA to the Host Site and local community during the VISTA's first few weeks of service.

How many VISTA Members can a Host Site apply for?

One VISTA Member will be placed with each Host Site. Host Sites can apply for a VISTA for up to 3 years. VHA will give priority to Host Sites that are currently in year 2 and 3 of their project to help promote sustainability.

VISTA Project: AHC Inc. develops affordable housing while helping communities thrive by providing its residents with educational and social services programs to help them build more stable and successful lives. The VISTA member will focus on expanding fundraising capability for AHC in general and Resident Services specifically. Primary activities will include proposal research and development, ensuring grants compliance for program oversight, and standardizing practices in AHC's grants and individual giving data warehouses. The VISTA member will also develop targeted social media and communications campaigns to increase AHC Inc.'s visibility and showcase resident voices in the community at a time of groundbreaking organizational change.



VISTA member: Christopher Concepcion

VISTA Bio: Christopher Concepcion is ambitious and excited to join the VISTA program with AHC. He is from a small town called Carbondale in Illinois. He is a recent graduate from George Mason University with a background in Business Management. Christopher is excited to be serving as a VISTA to help give back to the community in a more profound way. APAH COMMUNITY ANALYST VISTA

Host Site: Arlington Partnerships for Affordable Housing (APAH)

VISTA Project: Arlington Partnership for Affordable Housing's (APAH) mission is to develop, preserve, and own quality, affordable places to live, to promote stability and opportunity for their residents, and to advocate with the people and communities they serve. The VISTA member will develop a community needs assessment framework, also known as a community scan, with the goal of enabling APAH to meet their residents' needs more effectively and efficiently. The VISTA will also conduct market research in collaboration with APAH staff, aggregate resident service data to identify gaps and improvements, and develop a lived expertise committee to help compile stories and best practices that will be integrated into APAH's training and onboarding procedures.



VISTA member: Alyssa Parker

VISTA Bio: Alyssa has a Bachelor of Science in Soil and Crop Science from Colorado State University. She realized while attending she found that the causes and effects of food insecurity were of the utmost importance to her. CITY OF VB HOMELESS RESPONSE SYSTEM EQUITABLE STANDARDS OF CARE VISTA

Host Site: City of Virginia Beach Homeless Services Division

VISTA Project: The City of Virginia Beach Department of Housing and Neighborhood Preservation, Homeless Services Division is committed to help house the homeless and prevent families and individuals from becoming homeless. The VISTA member will be entrusted to develop and operationalize policies and procedures that contribute to a more efficient and client-centered system of service delivery. These standards of care are critical to promote quality and equitable services across programs, enhancing the system's capacity to effectively reduce the overall number of households experiencing homelessness. The VISTA will work to ensure that all standards of service are equitable in order to effectively identify and eliminate racial and ethnic bias.



VISTA member: Danielle Cantu

VISTA Bio: Danielle Cantu is originally from Gainesville, Georgia but currently lives in Chesapeake, Virginia with her husband, Rodi, and her dog, Hugo. After graduating high school, she enlisted in the Navy and worked as an IT in Hawaii and Japan. After leaving active duty, she moved to Washington, D.C. to pursue a degree in International Affairs at George Washington University. Danielle has always been interested in volunteering and serving others. Over the years, she has volunteered with local shelters, food banks, and local clean-up projects, because she is interested in helping animals and the people in her community. Her desire to serve her community and create meaningful and lasting change drew her to Americorps VISTA program. HABITAT RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT VISTA

Host Site: Habitat for Humanity of Virginia

VISTA Project: Habitat for Humanity of Virginia is dedicated to eliminating substandard housing locally and worldwide through constructing, rehabilitating and preserving homes; by advocating for fair and just housing policies; and by providing training and access to resources to help families improve their shelter conditions. The VISTA will strengthen Habitat affiliate partnerships across the Commonwealth by leading in the design of a Capacity Building conference, identifying new avenues of funding for Habitat's loan fund, and developing resources to help streamline services for affiliates. This project plays a vital role in building the capacity of Habitat affiliates so they can develop more quality affordable housing throughout Virginia.



VISTA member: Mike West

VISTA Bio: Michael West is a retired academic researcher and policy/program analyst, focused primarily in disability services for youth and adults. He has assisted non-profit organizations with pursuing grant funds and conducting project evaluations as either a consultant or as a volunteer. He and his family have resided in Virginia since 1987. Michael was attracted to the Virginia Housing Alliance's AmeriCorps VISTA program for several reasons. HOPE MULTIFAMILY PORTFOLIO SUPPORT SPECIALIST

Host Site: HOPE

VISTA Project: Helping Overcome Poverty's Existence, Inc. (HOPE) works to break generational poverty through enhanced food security and housing stability. The goal of the VISTA is to support HOPE's expanding housing portfolio, implement new equitable systems and procedures that enhance homeless and rapid re-housing services, and research best practices and models for both housing and homeless services. The VISTA will also support HOPE's work with area health care providers in collecting and aggregating critical housing and health data to support funding proposals, evaluate HOPE programs through both a racial equity and social determinant of health lens, and develop surveys that gauge service delivery satisfaction and program gaps.



VISTA member: Satya Fisher

VISTA Bio: Satya Fisher grew up on the island of Maui in Hawaii. Growing up in one of the most expensive housing markets in the United States, Fisher quickly saw the need for affordable housing. Through his year at HOPE Fisher hopes to learn about the development and financing of real estate projects. In his free time Fisher enjoys surfing, beekeeping, and being outdoors.

GWRC AFFORDABLE HOUSING LIAISON VISTA

Host Site: George Washington Regional Commission (GWRC)

VISTA Project: The George Washington Regional Commission (GWRC) serves as the Lead Agency of the Fredericksburg Regional Continuum of Care (CoC) and provides oversight and planning support to local efforts to prevent and end homelessness. The VISTA member will formalize a regional affordable housing approach by hosting stakeholder engagement sessions, developing regional affordable housing action items, and preparing the region for securing the resources necessary to add additional units to the region's currently limited affordable housing stock. In addition, the VISTA will develop a tracking mechanism to evaluate and monitor the region's effectiveness in bringing additional affordable housing units online.



VISTA member: Maddie Harris

VISTA Bio: Maddie Harris (they/she) graduated summa cum laude from Virginia Commonwealth University with a bachelor's in Psychology in 2020. Before VISTA, they did a variety of things including working as a research assistant in a child development lab, a behavior technician in autism services, and a teacher in South Korea. They have also volunteered with the Girl Scouts of America and the Children's Museum of Richmond. Maddie's future goals include getting their master's in social work specializing in macro social work and working further in affordable housing and with homeless populations. They became interested in this work with VHA VISTA through having their own and watching others' personal hardships concerning poverty and housing. They wanted to do more to help their community and provide better resources to others on a macro scale. MHCCV EDUCATION AND OUTREACH VISTA

Host Site: Manufactured Homes Community Coalition of Virginia

VISTA Project: The Manufactured Home Community Coalition of Virginia (MHCCV) is a nonprofit coalition committed to improving financial, legal, and material conditions for residents in Virginia's mobile home parks. The VISTA member will help build substantial capacity for MHCCV to continue its evolution from a "start-up" entity to a fully-formed organization by fulfilling the following five major goals: 1. Improve and preserve Virginia's existing manufactured home communities 2. Position MHCCV as the statewide resource hub for mobile home park revitalization 3. Educate and empower residents in manufactured home communities 4. Advance a positive public image of manufactured housing 5. Build sustainability into MHCCV's leadership, finances, programs, and services.



VISTA member: Noah Dalbey
