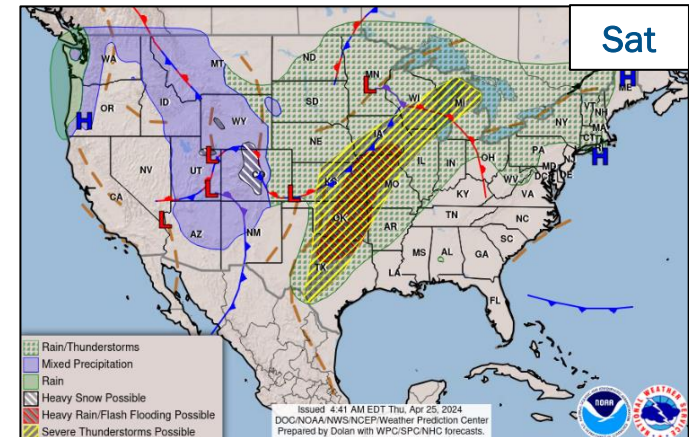

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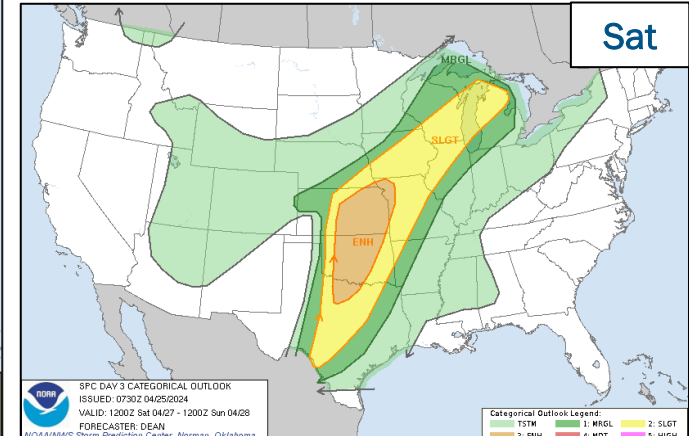
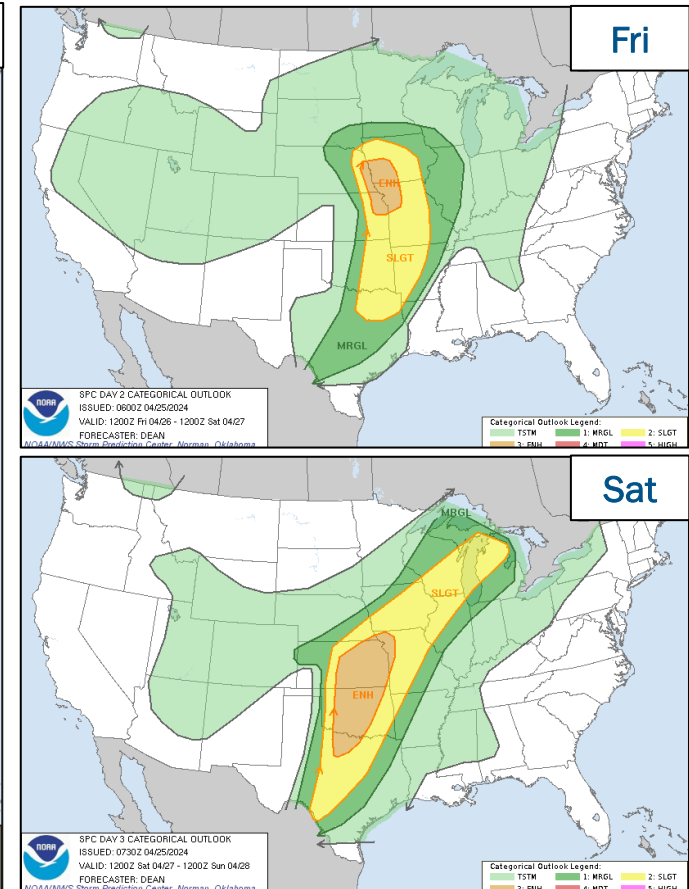
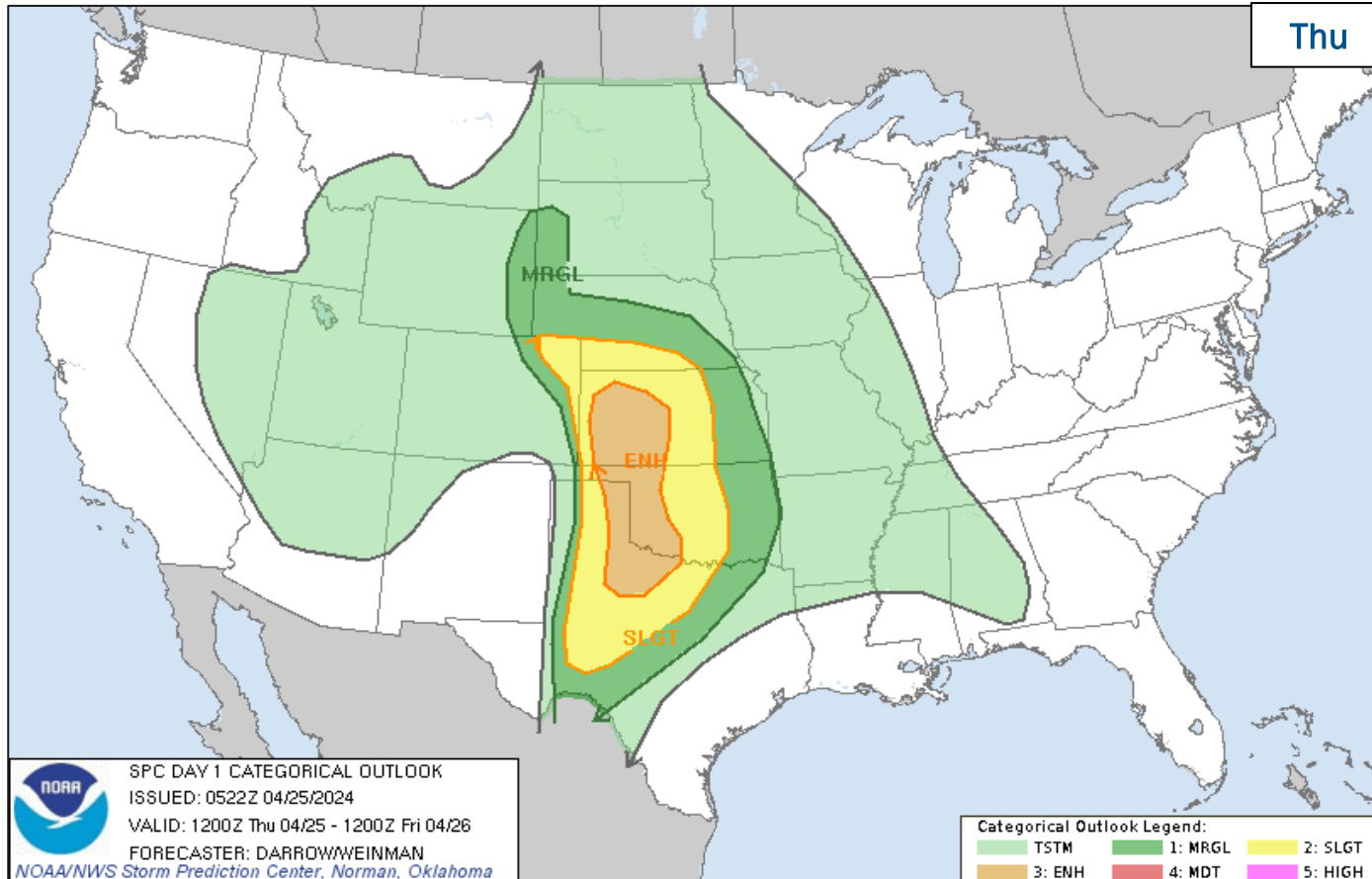
National Weather Forecast



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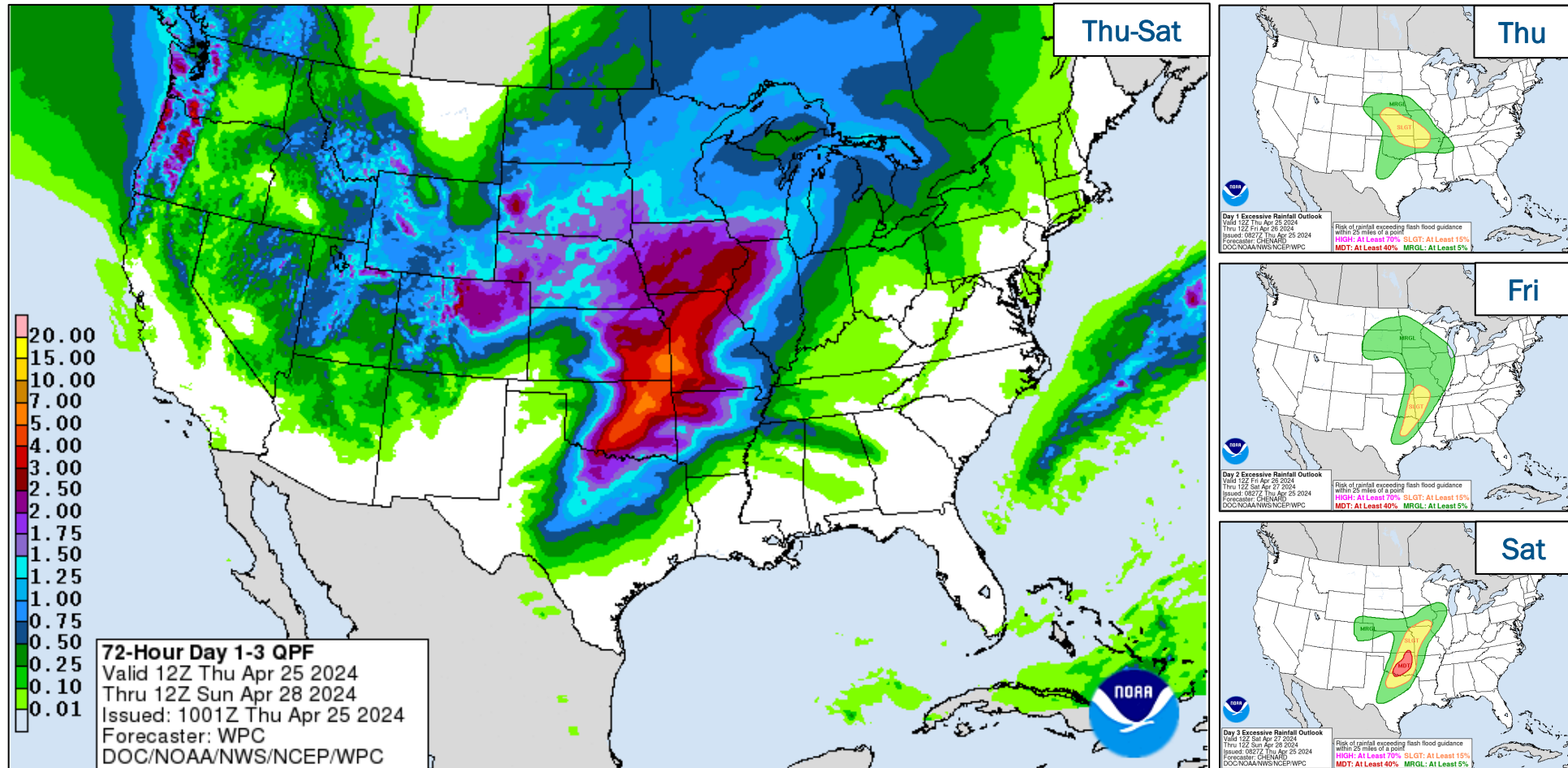
Severe Weather Outlook



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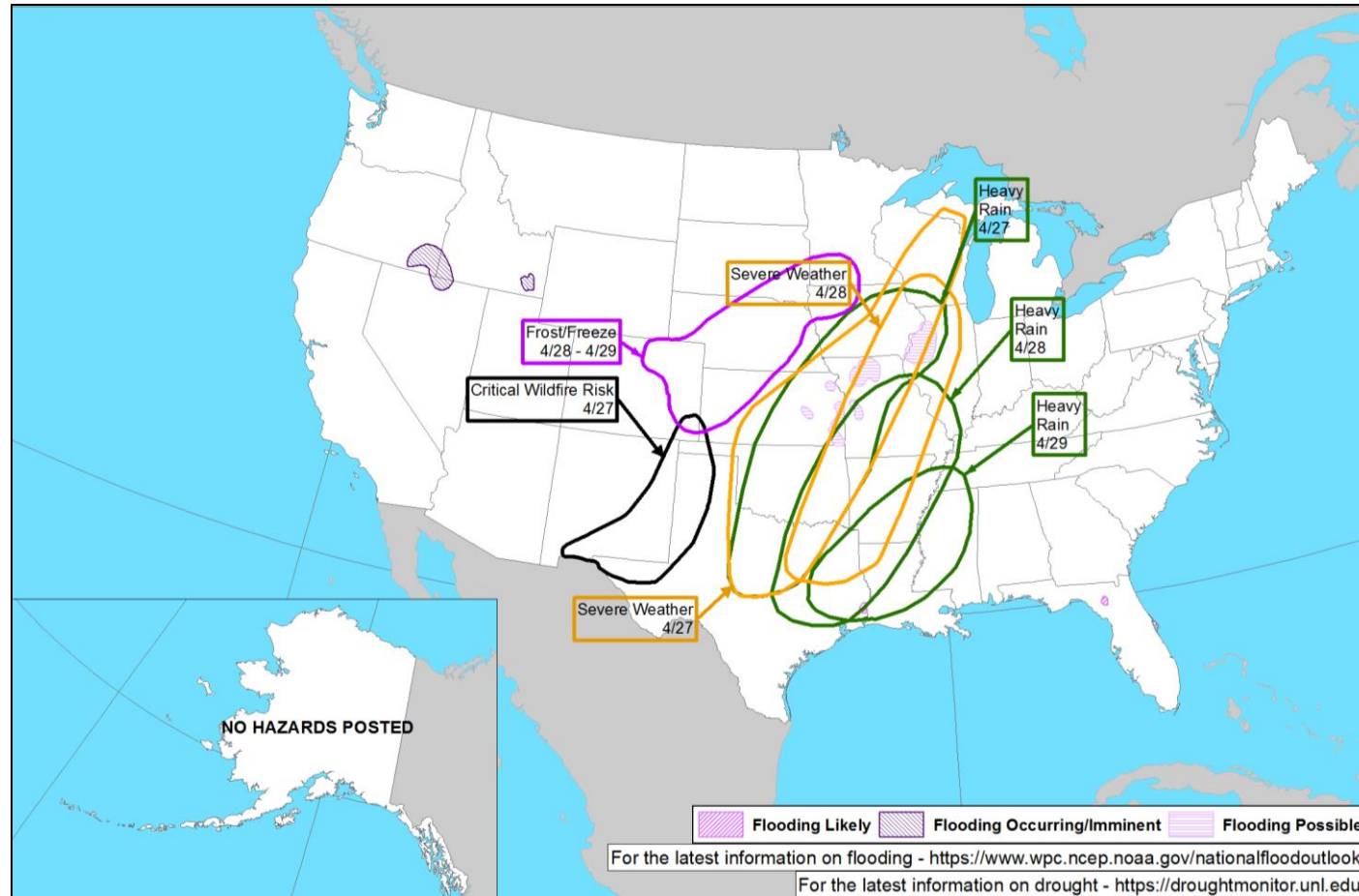
Precipitation & Excessive Rainfall

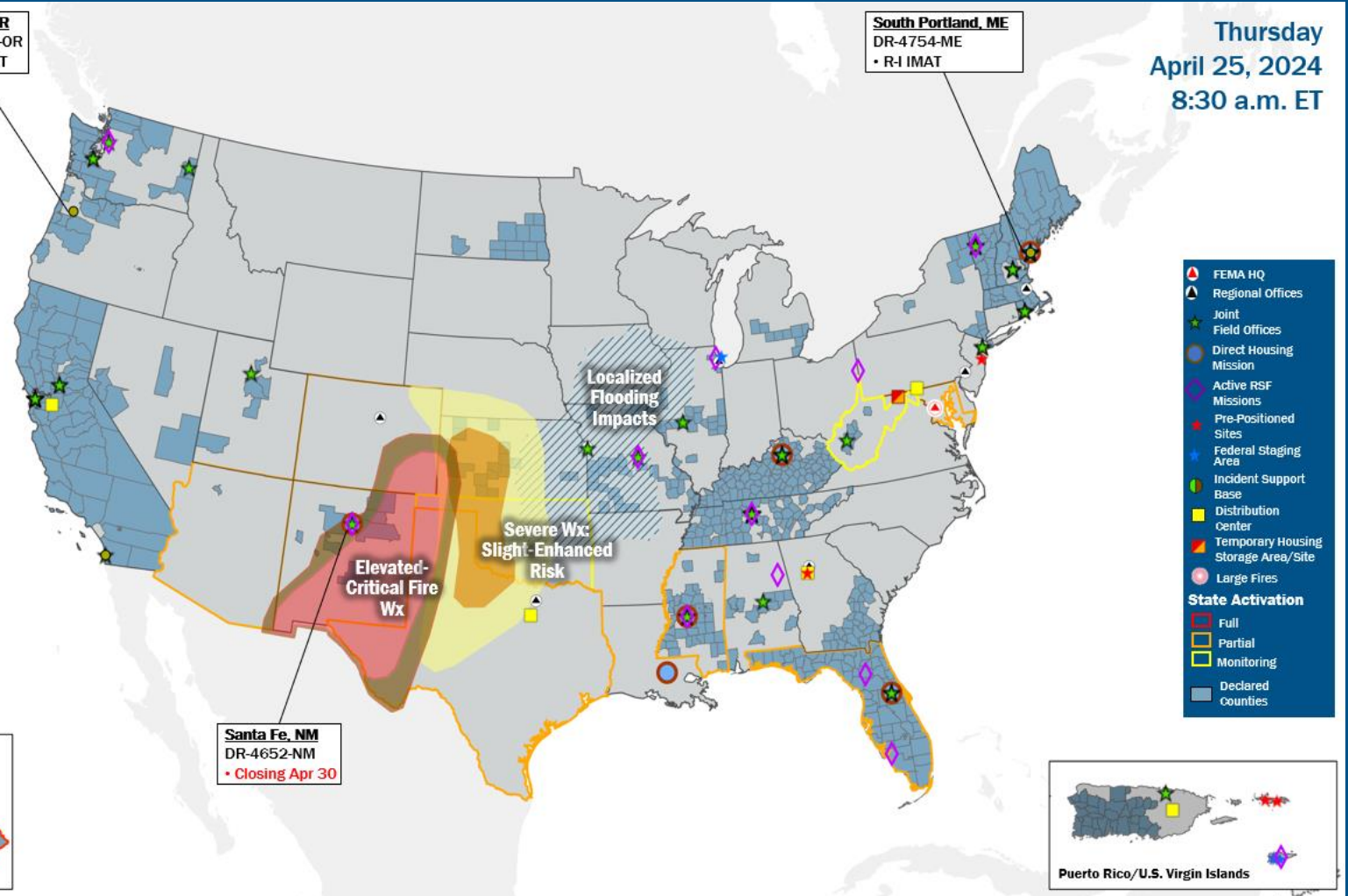

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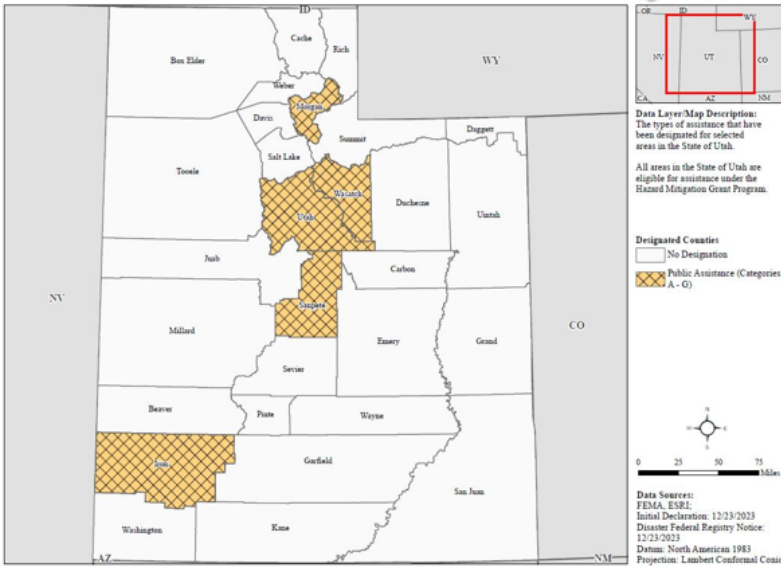

INCIDENT SUMMARY

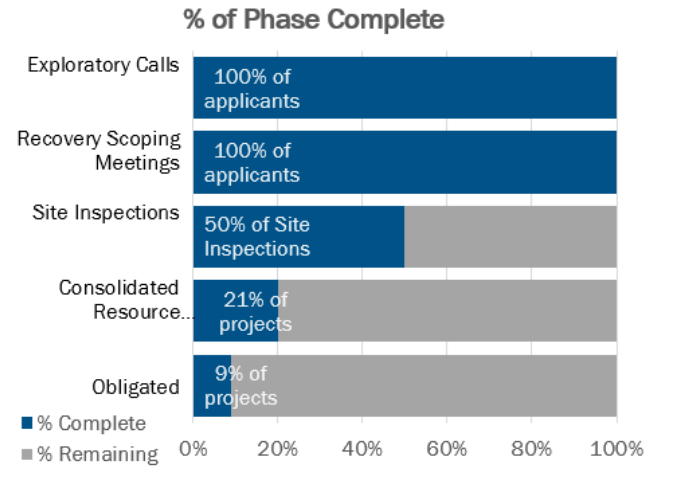
On December 23, 2023, a Major Disaster Declaration was declared for the State of Utah, due to impacts from floods occurring from May 1 – May 27, 2023. Iron, Morgan, Sanpete, Utah, and Wasatch Counties, were designated for Public Assistance (Cat. A-G) in addition to Hazard Mitigation statewide.

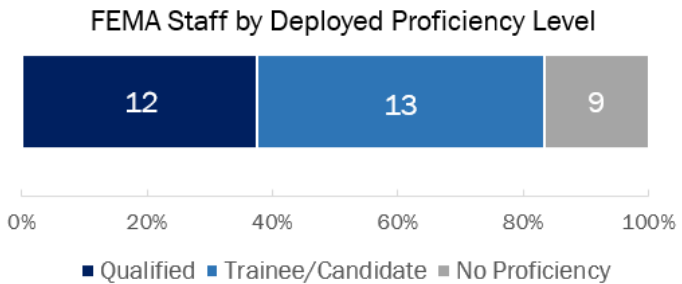

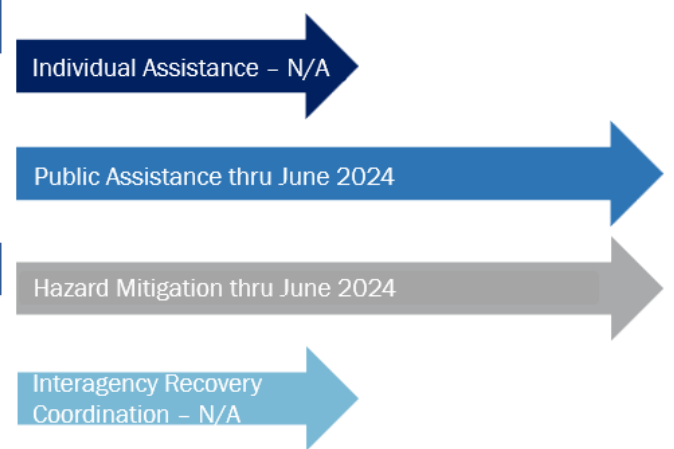
