Severe Weather – FEMA Region IV, V, & VII

Situation: Overnight the Strom Prediction Center reported thirteen (13) tornadoes, wind reports, and hail across FEMA Regions IV, V, & VII. Tornado Watches are in effect for AL, GA, KY, and TN until 11:00 a.m. ET. Severe weather will continue through today with an increase in the potential for tornadoes, damaging winds, and isolated flooding. The Storm Prediction Center maintains an Enhanced risk of severe weather from central TX to SC. All three regions continue to monitor. (*FEMA R-IV Status Update as of 5:38 a.m. ET, May 9*)

- KY: Minor residential structure damage








National Weather Forecast






Severe Weather Outlook






Precipitation & Excessive Rainfall








