







Severe Weather Outlook







Recovery Outcomes

RECOVERY OUTCOME: Housing

Outcome Indicator (1): All eligible displaced survivors are in a safe and secure residence prior to the end of the 18-month deadline of the Individuals and Households Program

- A total of \$839,000 out of the \$2.6 MIL IHP dollars were approved after JFO Engagement (34%)
- Lack of American Sign Language interpreters was identified in WV (five (5) certified in the entire State), compounded by areas with limited cell coverage preventing use of video remote interpreting (VRI). Disability Integration was able to support survivors.

RECOVERY OUTCOME: Community Assistance

Outcome Indicator (4): Mitigation measures are implemented to manage and reduce damaging effects of future hazards

- \$10 million is available for Flood Mitigation Assistance Swift Current
 - 300+ mailers were sent out to National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) holders
 - The State of WV is aggressively pursuing this the Mitigation Assistance

RECOVERY OUTCOME: Health and Social Services

Outcome Indicator (3): Ensure survivors are provided necessary behavioral health and disaster case management services.

 The State's Disaster Case Management (DCM) application was reviewed by the Governor and is with the Region for final review and approval
