2020 – Today: Meeting Evolving Communal Needs

While the financial vulnerabilities facing many community members arose well before the COVID-19 pandemic and its ensuing economic crisis, it was clear that, for many, COVID-19 significantly exacerbated challenging situations. Your support empowered Federation to address these needs swiftly and comprehensively using a variety of tactics to understand the changing circumstances, including convening community leaders and ongoing data collection.

In 2017, the Jewish Community Demographic Study, funded by the Morningstar Foundation, revealed that nearly 5,000 households in the Greater Washington Jewish community reported being unable to afford an unexpected \$400 expense, and that three percent – about 4,000 local Jewish households – received needs-based government assistance. Many in this group received assistance from Federation's human service partners with vital support from Federation and our donors, and from local, state, and Federal entities. But in 2020, the pandemic's impact left nearly 30% more Jewish DC, MD, and Northern VA households unable to afford an emergency \$400 expense.

Locally, just as we saw nationally, the economic impact of COVID-19 was significantly greater on certain segments of the population. In the summer of 2020, Federation partnered with Brandeis University researchers to conduct a targeted local community study on these impacts. This survey found that:

- 41% of those just able/not able to make ends meet before COVID-19 reported that, since the crisis began, their jobs were affected negatively with impacts including reduced hours, pay cuts, furloughs, or layoffs.
- 45% of those living in an unstable financial situation prior to the pandemic experienced further deteriorating financial situations and struggled to make ends meet.
- Respondents between ages 18-34 were 50% more likely to report being lonely often or all the time.
- Amongst Jews under 40, an estimated 21,600 individuals raising young children found it especially hard to cope during the pandemic, while an estimated 11,000+ non-parents under 40 reported being lonely often or all the time.

At the same time, across Greater Washington, Feeding America reported that 199,850 children faced food insecurity in 2020, up by 92% from 2018.

With your generous support and leveraging our 95 years of experience of seeing Jewish Greater Washington through times of calm and crisis, Federation worked swiftly to raise essential funds and to develop and implement a multi-faceted approach to help those in need. During the first year of our



COVID-19 response effort, Federation developed new programs and partnerships to provide direct assistance to individuals and families facing hardships, including through financial support distributed by rabbis and other partners throughout the region.

It is an understatement that your support saw our community members through one of the most difficult moments in their lives.

Today, that generous support, coupled with Federation's data-informed approach and deep communal relationships, ensures we can continue to evolve our strategy in line with our community's changing needs.

Your Impact: By the Dollars

Between 2020 and 2022, Federation invested an incremental **\$3,498,772** to meet the needs of individuals and families. This support includes but is not limited to:

- **\$729,689** in cash assistance grants for 1,263 individuals across 92 Greater Washington zip codes, to make up for lost wages, cover rent and mortgage payments, pay for groceries and basic supplies, improve access to mental health services, and assist with job and loan applications. Of dollars granted to individuals during the height of the pandemic, 40% was used for rent or mortgage payments and 33% for food assistance.
- \$1.2M+ in cumulative funds to support the growth of 703-J-CARING: the Jewish Community Support Line, launched in partnership with JSSA. This investment includes the new Care Navigator Program, additional funds allocated to addressing food insecurity, and work to build broader communal awareness of available resources. To date, 1,249 callers have received Support Line assistance. The Support Line is also seeing a significant increase in its weekly usage, fielding 50% more calls as of October 2022 than two years ago.
- \$1.4M+ in scholarships and grants provided to 2,000 families across Greater Washington to empower their children to attend summer camp. Nearly 60% of campers who received these scholarships would not have otherwise attended. 88% of recipients who planned to return to camp the following year anticipated needing aid again.

Of course, while vital, crisis response is not the same as long term strategy. Moreover, the ongoing challenges facing individuals and families in need may be distinct from those during a crisis – and longer lasting for some more than others.

Where We Go From Here

In 2021, Federation convened professionals and lay leaders from across local organizations to evaluate the nature and challenges of evolving poverty and economic insecurity within the Jewish community, and to develop an integrated approach to meeting these broad challenges. Research has shown that those facing poverty or economic insecurity within the Jewish community tend to have multiple needs. As we considered our challenges and potential responses, we knew we needed to implement a variety of approaches. This continuing work includes:

- 1) **Supporting and expanding resources and access to them:** While there are significant resources available to our Jewish community, including the 703-J-CARING Support Line, too few people are aware of them. We are investing in both the expansion of resources and furthering awareness to increase their utilization.
 - a. Through our funding of **Care Navigators** an enhancement of the Support Line JSSA professionals provide in-depth case management support for individuals and families who



require substantive assistance and navigation of resources. The system creates a blueprint for integrated case management across the community to address complex situations in the short-term, and in the long-term, to help us learn how to solve for the root causes of economic insecurity.

- b. We must also **address local food insecurity**. Federation is working with several partners to both provide immediate assistance to those suffering from hunger who may not seek other types of assistance, and simultaneously create an entry point for those seeking food assistance to also access broader services.
- 2) Collecting and utilizing data: We are collectively working to increase our existing data collection and gather new information to get a clearer sense of those in need, including family structure, geographic location, and underlying factors leading to economic vulnerability, among others. This data will be essential to informing and strengthening our ongoing and new efforts.

Thanks to your generous support and other investments in our Individuals & Families in Need Fund, including matching funds from the Jewish Federations of North America, Federation has raised \$6.83 million for this work as well as other emergency response efforts to COVID-19 since 2020 and will continue to advance these mechanisms in 2022 and beyond.

We are committed to the continued evolution of our strategy and pursuit of our goal: to ensure that all Jewish community members facing economic vulnerability can receive support from within the Jewish community. We look forward to future discussions and to sharing periodic updates about this work with you.
